American System-Built Homes They were developed between 1911 and 1917 to fulfill his interest in affordable housing but were sold commercially for just 14 months. The Wright archives include 973 drawings and hundreds of reference materials, the largest collection of any of single Wright project. Milled and marked materials were delivered to the work site for cutting and assembly by a carpenter. Wright cancelled the project in July 1917 by successfully suing his partner Arthur Richards for payments due and rarely spoke of the program again. Richards' yard also supplied plaster, concrete. Most materials were prepared and organized at Arthur Richards' lumber yard, so there was less waste and specialized labor needed for construction. The designs were standardized and modular, so customers could choose from one hundred and twenty nine models on seven floorplans and three roof styles. Most wood parts had a part number and corresponding instructions and drawings for joining, fit and finish. Frames, shelves, trim and some fixtures were cut and assembled on site. The first of the How houses to be built is the Daniel How House at 23 Danforth Street. Built in 1799, it is a 2+1/2-story brick building, trimmed with granite, and featuring a Doric entrance portico. It was built by Daniel How, a native of Methuen, Massachusetts, on land belonging to his father-in-law. The second house, that of Daniel's son John, was built by Daniel as a wedding present for his son in 1817. It stands at 40 Pleasant Street, and has similar Federal styling to the father's house. Its entrance is recessed in an archway, with sidelight and fanlight transom windows. The third house, a double house at 30-32 Pleasant Street, was built in 1818 by Daniel's brother Joseph. The Daniel How House stands on the north side of Danforth Street, near its eastern end just uphill from Portland's commercial waterfront. It is a 2+1/2-story brick structure, built from locally sourced bricks laid in common bond. Windows have brownstone lintels, and the main entrance is a sympathetic recreation of a period entrance, the original having been lost. The building's interior retains most of its original woodwork and flooring, with a particularly fine central staircase.
