The units of analysis in lexical semantics are lexical units which include not only words but also sub-words or sub-units such as affixes and even compound words and phrases. Frame semantics (linguistics) The basic idea is that one cannot understand the meaning of a single word without access to all the essential knowledge that relates to that word. Natural semantic metalanguage The theory was formally developed by Anna Wierzbicka at Warsaw University and later at the Australian National University in the early 1970s, and Cliff Goddard at Australia's Griffith University.
