Nicole Vaidišová won the title, defeating Laura Granville in the final. At 15 years and 3 months of age, Vaidišová became the 6th youngest woman to win a Pro-level title, and the youngest since 1997. abe23472b7

ITF tournaments were not part of the 2003 WTA Tour, although they award points for the WTA World Ranking. The 2003 WTA Tour included the four Grand Slam tournaments, the WTA Tour Championships and the WTA Tier I, Tier II, Tier III, Tier IV and Tier V events abe23472b7

This event marked the first major appearances for future world No. 1 and major champion Ana Ivanovic and two-time major champion Li Na. Both reached the third round before losing to Amélie Mauresmo and Sharapova, respectively. abe23472b7 This tournament marked the first career meeting between Serena Williams and Maria Sharapova; Williams won in straight sets in their fourth-round encounter. abe23472b7

Serena Williams defeated Lindsay Davenport in the final, 2–6, 6–3, 6–0 to win the women's singles tennis title at the 2005 Australian Open. Just as during her first Australian Open title run, Williams saved match points en route to the title, saving three in the semifinals against Maria Sharapova. It was her second Australian Open singles title and her seventh major singles title overall abe23472b7

Anna-Lena Grönefeld was the defending champion from 2003, but lost in the second round to Sessil Karatantcheva. abe23472b7

Amélie Mauresmo put together a consistent season, reaching No. 1 in September and finishing the year ranked No. 2.
