as well as
neurobiological factors
that are implicated in
the development of
addiction. Repetitive
drug use can alter brain
function in synapses
similar to natural
rewards like food or
falling in love in ways
that perpetuate craving
and weakens self-control
for people with pre-
existing vulnerabilities.
While mice given cocaine
showed the compulsive and
involuntary nature of
addiction, for humans
this is more complex,
related to behavior

The learning material is
in a kind of textbook or
teaching machine or
computer. The medium
presents the material in
a logical and tested

sequence. The text is in small steps or larger chunks. After each step, learners are given a question to test their comprehension. Then immediately the correct answer is shown. This means the learner at all stages makes responses, and is given immediate knowledge of results.

deca03b682 Skinner developed behavior analysis, especially the philosophy of radical behaviorism, and founded the experimental analysis of behavior, a school of experimental research psychology. He also used operant conditioning to strengthen behavior, considering the rate of response to be the most effective measure of response strength. To study operant conditioning, he invented the operant conditioning

chamber (aka the Skinner box), and to measure rate he invented the cumulative recorder. Using these tools, he and Charles Ferster produced Skinner's most influential... deca03b682

Reinforcement Punishment is the inverse to reinforcement, referring to any behavior that decreases the likelihood that. Likewise, a student that receives attention and praise when answering a teacher's question will be more likely to answer future questions in class; the teacher's question is the antecedent, the student's response is the behavior, and the praise and attention are the reinforcements. psychology, reinforcement refers to consequences that increase the

likelihood of an organism's future behavior, typically in the presence of a particular In behavioral psychology, reinforcement refers to consequences that increase the likelihood of an organism's future behavior, typically in the presence of a particular antecedent stimulus. For example, a rat can be trained to push a lever to receive food whenever a light is turned on; in this example, the light is the antecedent stimulus, the lever pushing is the operant behavior, and the food is the reinforcer

Behaviorism It assumes that behavior is either a reflex elicited by the pairing of certain antecedent stimuli in the environment, or a consequence of that

individual's history,
including especially
reinforcement and
punishment contingencies,
together with the
individual's current
motivational state and
controlling stimuli.
Although behaviorists
generally accept the
important role of
heredity in determining
behavior, deriving from
Skinner's two levels of
selection (phylogeny and
ontogeny), they focus
primarily on
environmental events. The
cognitive revolution of
the late 20th century
largely replaced
behaviorism as an
explanatory theory with
cognitive psychology,
which unlike behaviorism
views internal mental
states. antecedent
