Greene has often emphasized the normative implications of the theory, which has started an extensive debate in ethics. Initially proposed by Joshua Greene along with Brian Sommerville, Leigh Nystrom, John Darley, Jonathan David Cohen and others, the theory can be seen as a domain-specific example of more general dual process accounts in psychology, such as Daniel Kahneman's "system1"/"system 2" distinction popularised in his book, Thinking, Fast and Slow f605702e11

However, some theorists take the view to be one which claims that both moral facts and how one comes to be justified in believing them are necessarily. Moral sense theory typically holds that distinctions between morality and immorality are discovered by emotional responses to experience. Others take the view to be primarily about the nature of justifying moral beliefs (a primarily epistemological view)—this form of the view more often goes by the name "moral sense theory". This is alluded to in the subtitle of his most famous work, The Fable of The Bees: or, Private Vices, Public Benefits. More famously, it is also used once in his Wealth of Nations, when arguing that governments do not normally need to force international traders to invest in their own home country.
