The majority of legislation affecting Scotland and Scots law is primarily passed by the Scottish Parliament, who legislate on all areas of devolved responsibility, whilst the Parliament of the United Kingdom legislates only on reserved matters. It is a hybrid or mixed legal system containing civil law and common law elements, that traces its roots to a number of different historical sources. Scots law (Scottish Gaelic: Lagh na h-Alba) is the legal system of Scotland. Some legislation passed by the Parliament of Scotland regarding the Kingdom of Scotland is still also valid. Scots law recognises four sources of law: legislation, legal precedent, specific academic writings, and custom.
