The theory explains the interaction of antibodies and antigens in the blood, and how antibodies are produced. He named the hypothetical agent as Zauberkugel, and used the English translation "magic bullet" in The Harben Lectures at London. The name itself is a reference to an old German myth about a bullet that cannot miss its target.
