URL redirection is done for various reasons: A friendly URL may be desired for messaging technologies that limit the number of characters in a message (for example SMS), for reducing the amount of typing required if the reader is copying a URL from a print source, for making it easier for a person to remember, or for the intention of a permalink. In November 2009, the shortened links of the URL shortening service Bitly were accessed 2.1 billion times. for hostile purposes such as phishing attacks or

malware distribution. In such an attack scenario, an unsuspecting computer user visits a website and observes a familiar URL, like <http://www.wikipedia.org>, in the address bar. However, unbeknownst to them, the information they input is being directed to a completely different location, usually monitored by an information thief. When a fraudulent website requests sensitive information, it's referred to as phishing. In a different variation, a website might resemble the original but is, in reality, a parody. These instances are generally harmless and conspicuously distinct from the genuine sites, as they typically do not exploit web browser vulnerabilities. TinyURL offers an API which allows applications to automatically create short URLs. Clean URLs also do not contain implementation details of the underlying web application. This carries the benefit of reducing the difficulty of changing the implementation of the resource at a later date. For example, many URLs include the filename of a server-side script, such as `example.php`, `example.asp` or `cgi-bin`. Rewrite engine Rewritten URLs (sometimes known as short, pretty or fancy URLs, search engine friendly - SEF URLs, or slugs) are used to provide shorter and more relevant-looking links to web pages. The engine is typically a component of a web server or web application framework. The technique adds a layer of abstraction between the files used to generate a web page and the URL that is presented to the outside world.
