Silent Way Gattegno continued to develop and describe the Silent Way until. Gattegno was critical of mainstream language education at the time, and he based the Silent Way on his general theories of education rather than on existing language pedagogy. During the Renaissance, the term "humanities" referred to the study of classical literature and language, as opposed to the study of religion, or "divinity". The studia humanitatis was a course of studies that consisted of grammar, literature, rhetoric, history, and moral philosophy, primarily derived from the study of ancient Greek and Latin authors. Humanities are academic disciplines that study aspects of human society and culture, including certain fundamental questions asked by humans. They use methods that are primarily critical, speculative, or interpretative and have a significant historical element—as distinguished from the mainly empirical approaches of science. Today, the humanities are more frequently defined as any
