This theory is characterized by both definitive eras as well as transition phases, whose purpose is to facilitate a smooth transition out of one era and into the next. Prosocial behavior unselfish interest in helping another person. The person may or may not intend to benefit others; the behavior's prosocial benefits are often only calculable after the fact. According to psychology professor John W. (Consider: Someone may intend to 'do good' but the effects may be catastrophic. These actions may be motivated by culturally influenced value systems; empathy and concern about the welfare and rights of others; egoistic or practical concerns, such as one's social status or reputation, hope for direct or indirect reciprocity, or adherence. Santrock, the circumstances most likely to evoke altruism are empathy Prosocial behavior is a social behavior that "benefit[s] other people or society as a whole", "such as helping, sharing, donating, co-operating, and volunteering".)
