Droplet-based microfluidics A microfluidic Droplet-based microfluidics manipulate discrete volumes of fluids in immiscible phases with low Reynolds number ($\ll 2300$) and laminar flow regimes. Two immiscible phases used for the droplet based systems are referred to as the continuous phase (medium in which droplets flow) and dispersed phase (the droplet phase), resulting in either water-in-oil (W/O) or oil-in-water (O/W) emulsion droplets. Microdroplets offer the feasibility of handling miniature volumes (μL to fL) of fluids conveniently, provide better mixing, encapsulation, sorting, sensing and are suitable for high throughput experiments. protein engineering, directed evolution has many applications in fields from development of drugs and vaccines to the synthesis of food and chemicals.
