He achieved international recognition in 1981 for his book Transformational Syntax, which sold over 30,000 copies and was the standard introduction to Chomsky's Government and Binding Theory for many years; and this was followed by an introduction to transformational grammar in 1988, which sold over 70,000. His first important contribution to the field was his 1977 book on Italian syntax, a revised version of his doctoral thesis

Syntactic Structures A short monograph of about a hundred pages Syntactic Structures is a seminal work in linguistics by American linguist Noam Chomsky, originally published in 1957. It contains the now-famous sentence "Colorless green ideas sleep furiously", which Chomsky offered as an example of a grammatically correct sentence that has no discernible meaning, thus arguing for the independence of syntax (the study of sentence structures) from semantics (the study of meaning). A short monograph of about a hundred pages, it is recognized as one of the most significant and influential linguistic studies of the 20th century. As such, it is characterized by a broad and diverse range of research directions. For Chomsky, there are two basic minimalist questions—What is language? and Why does it have the properties it has?—but the answers to these two questions can be framed in any theory. Generative grammar began in the late 1950s with the work of Noam... Based on lecture notes he had prepared for his students at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in the mid-1950s, *Syntactic Structures* was Chomsky's first book on linguistics and reflected the contemporary developments in early generative... The musical collaboration between Lerdahl and Jackendoff was inspired by Leonard Bernstein's 1973 Charles Eliot Norton Lectures at Harvard University, wherein he called for researchers to uncover a musical grammar that could explain the human musical mind in a scientific manner comparable to Noam Chomsky's revolutionary transformational or generative grammar.

Generative linguists, or generativists (), tend to share certain working assumptions such as the competence-performance distinction and the notion that some domain-specific aspects of grammar are partly innate in humans. The earliest version of Chomsky's model was called Transformational grammar Generative grammar is a research tradition in linguistics that aims to explain the cognitive basis of language by formulating and testing explicit models of humans' subconscious grammatical knowledge. Generative linguistics includes work in core areas such as syntax, semantics, phonology, psycholinguistics, and language acquisition, with additional extensions to topics including biolinguistics and music cognition. These assumptions are rejected in non-generative approaches such as usage-based models of language
