Daemonologie It was reprinted again in 1603 when James took the throne of England. The widespread consensus is that King James wrote *Daemonologie* in response to sceptical publications such as Reginald Scot's *The Discoverie of Witchcraft*. one of the main sources used by William Shakespeare in the production of *Macbeth*. Shakespeare attributed many quotes and rituals found within the book directly to *Daemonologie*—in full *Dæmonologie, In Forme of a Dialogue, Divided into three Books: By the High and Mightie Prince, James &c.*—was first published in 1597 by King James VI of Scotland (later also James I of England) as a philosophical dissertation on contemporary necromancy and the historical relationships between the various methods of divination used from ancient black magic

Three Witches Other possible sources, apart from Shakespeare, include British folklore, contemporary treatises on witchcraft as King James VI of Scotland's *Daemonologie*, the Witch of Endor from the Bible, the Norns of Norse mythology, and ancient classical myths of the Fates: the Greek Moirai and the Roman Parcae. 1603–1607). In Act 1, Scene 3, they greet Macbeth with a prophecy that he shall "become king". The Three Witches, also known as the Weird Sisters, Weyward Sisters or Wayward Sisters, are characters in William Shakespeare's play *Macbeth* (c. 1606). The witches eventually lead Macbeth to his demise, and they hold a striking resemblance to the three Fates of classical mythology. Three Witches first appear in Act 1, Scene 1, where they agree to meet later with Macbeth. Their origin lies in Holinshed's *Chronicles* (1587), a history of England, Scotland and Ireland

Daemonologie included a study of demonology and the methods demons used to bother troubled men. The book endorses the practice of witch hunting. *Sleep No More* adapted the story of *Macbeth*, deprived of nearly all spoken dialogue and set primarily in the 19th century. This book is believed to be one of the main sources... In the play, a brave Scottish general named Macbeth receives a prophecy from a trio of witches that one day he will become King of Scotland. Consumed by ambition and spurred to violence by his wife, Macbeth murders the king and takes the Scottish throne for himself.

Shakespeare's influence on Tolkien Tolkien disapproved in particular of Shakespeare's devaluation of elves, and was deeply disappointed by the prosaic explanation of how Birnam Wood came to Dunsinane Hill in *Macbeth*. Tolkien was influenced especially by *Macbeth* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, and he used King Lear for "issues of kingship, madness, and succession". Shakespeare's influence on Tolkien was substantial, despite Tolkien's professed dislike of the playwright. He arguably drew on several other plays, including *The Merchant of Venice*, *Henry IV, Part 1*, and *Love's Labour's Lost*, as well as Shakespeare's poetry, for numerous effects in his Middle-earth writings.
