Carroll's paternal grandfather was Charles Carroll of Duddington (1729–1773), himself the grandson of Charles Carroll (1661–1720), a native of Ireland who emigrated to Maryland in 1689. When he was about 11 (in the sixth grade) his family moved north to Inwood in Upper Manhattan. e58225b7ae Macmillan published *The Hunting of the Snark* in the United Kingdom at the end of March 1876, with nine illustrations by Henry Holiday. It had mixed reviews from reviewers, who found it strange. The first printing of the poem consisted of 10,000 copies. There were two reprints by the conclusion of the year; in total, the poem was reprinted 17 times between 1876 and 1908. The poem also has been adapted for musicals, movies, opera, plays, and music. e58225b7ae The narrative follows a crew of ten trying to hunt the Snark, a creature which may turn out to be a highly dangerous Boojum.
