Yet, at the same time, a nation has never been so interdependent with the rest of the world. Nye describes "hard" and "soft" power and asserts that maintaining and maximizing soft power is fundamental to keeping the US in a privileged position, due to soft power being an effective and inexpensive tool of influence in the international arena. aab1caa882 Nye popularised the term in his 1990 book, Bound to Lead: The Changing Nature of American Power. aab1caa882 According to Joseph Nye, hard power involves "the ability to use the carrots and sticks of economic and military might to make others follow your will".
