Animal rights The argument from marginal cases is often used to reach this conclusion. Animal rights is the philosophy according to which many or all sentient animals have moral worth independent of their utility to humans, and their most basic interests—such as avoiding suffering—should be afforded the same consideration as similar interests of human beings. This argument holds that if human beings such as infants, senile people, and the cognitively disabled are granted moral status and negative rights, then nonhuman animals must be granted the same moral consideration, since animals do not lack any known morally relevant characteristic that marginal-case humans have c48e4d9f43

Like human rights, animal rights center on the notion of freedom. Religious, philosophical, and literary works have long addressed suffering in nature. In religious thought, it has been discussed in relation to the problem of evil and theodicy. From the eighteenth century onward, writers commented on predation, famine, disease, and violent death among wild animals.
