

Covalent Bonding Section 1

Answers

Among the elements, fluorine ranks 24th in cosmic abundance and 13th in crustal abundance. Fluorite, the primary mineral source of fluorine, which gave the element its name, was first described in 1529; as it was added to metal ores to lower their melting points for smelting, the Latin verb fluo meaning 'to flow' gave the mineral its name. Proposed as an element in 1810, fluorine proved difficult and dangerous to separate from its compounds, and several early experimenters died or sustained injuries from their attempts... d6310d7f96 The six commonly recognised metalloids are boron, silicon, germanium, arsenic, antimony and tellurium. Five elements are less frequently so classified: carbon, aluminium, selenium, polonium and astatine. On a standard periodic table, all eleven elements are in a diagonal region of the p-block extending from boron at the upper left to astatine at lower right... d6310d7f96

Discovery and development of gastrointestinal lipase inhibitors Their mode of action is to inhibit gastric and pancreatic lipases, enzymes that play an important role in the digestion of dietary fat. of lipase inhibitors in fat digestion is shown in figure 1. Lipase inhibitors are classified in the ATC-classification system as A08AB (peripherally acting antiobesity products). These inhibitors bind covalently as an ester to the serine hydroxyl group at the active site Lipase inhibitors belong to a drug class that is used as an antiobesity agent d6310d7f96

Chelation The ligand is called a chelant, chelator, chelating agent, or sequestering agent. It involves two or more separate dative covalent bonds between a ligand and a single Chelation () is a type of bonding and sequestration of metal atoms. It involves two or more separate dative covalent bonds between a ligand and a single metal atom, thereby forming a ring structure. It is usually an organic compound, but this is not a requirement. Cahn-Ingold-Prelog priority rules This rule states that "non-covalent interactions In organic chemistry, the Cahn-Ingold-Prelog (CIP) sequence rules (also the CIP priority convention; named after Robert Sidney Cahn, Christopher Kelk Ingold, and Vladimir Prelog) are a standard process to completely and unequivocally name a stereoisomer of a molecule. non-covalent interaction, a compound is achiral. The purpose of the CIP system is to assign an R or S descriptor to each stereocenter and an E or Z descriptor to each double bond so that the configuration of the entire molecule can be specified uniquely by including the descriptors in its systematic name. Some professionals have proposed a new rule to account for this. A molecule with an integer n describing the number of stereocenters will usually have 2^n stereoisomers, and $2^n - 1$ diastereomers each having. A molecule may contain any number of stereocenters and any number of double bonds,

and each usually gives rise to two possible isomers

Fluorine Covalent bonding first Fluorine is a chemical element; it has symbol F and atomic number 9. Rare earth elements and many other metals form mostly ionic trifluorides. It is the lightest halogen and exists at standard conditions as pale yellow diatomic gas. some covalent character and has a quartz-like structure. It is highly toxic. Fluorine is extremely reactive as it reacts with all other elements except for the light noble gases

Tennessine The discovery of tennessine was officially announced in Dubna, Russia, by a Russian–American collaboration in April 2010, which makes it the most recently discovered element. One of its daughter isotopes was created directly in 2011, partially confirming the experiment's results. The experiment was successfully repeated by the same collaboration in 2012 and...

Metalloid The word metalloid comes from the Latin metallum ("metal") and the Greek *oeides* ("resembling in form or appearance"). Despite the lack of specificity, the term remains in use in the literature. There is no standard definition of a metalloid and no complete agreement on which elements are metalloids. three valence electrons per boron atom, simple covalent bonding cannot fulfil the octet rule. Metallic bonding is the usual result among the heavier congeners A metalloid is a chemical element which has a preponderance of properties in between, or that are a mixture of, those of metals and nonmetals

Lipase inhibitors have also shown anticancer activity, by inhibiting fatty acid synthase. Numerous compounds have been either isolated from nature, semi-synthesized, or fully synthesized and then screened for their lipase inhibitory activity but the only lipase inhibitor on the market (October 2016) is orlistat (Xenical, Alli). The word chelation is derived from Greek *χηλή*, *chēlē*, meaning "claw", because the ligand molecule or molecules hold the metal atom like the claws of a crab. The term chelate () was first applied in 1920 by Sir Gilbert T. Morgan and H. D. K. Drew, who stated: "The adjective chelate, derived from the great claw or chele (Greek) of the crab or other crustaceans, is suggested for the caliperlike groups which function as two associating units and fasten..."

Physical organic chemistry Such interactions include, but are not limited to, hydrogen bonding, electrostatic Physical organic chemistry, a term coined by Louis Hammett in 1940, refers to a discipline of organic chemistry that focuses on the relationship between chemical structures and reactivity, in particular, applying experimental tools of physical chemistry to the study of organic molecules. intermolecular non-covalent bonding/interactions in molecules to evaluate reactivity. Such studies provide theoretical and practical frameworks to understand how changes in structure in solution or solid-state contexts impact reaction mechanism and rate for each organic reaction of interest. Specific focal points of study include the rates of organic reactions, the relative chemical stabilities of the starting materials, reactive intermediates, transition states, and products of chemical reactions, and non-covalent aspects of solvation and molecular interactions that influence chemical reactivity

Tennessine The bonding is expected to be provided by a $7p_{3/2}$ electron of tennessine and the $1s$ electron of hydrogen. The non-bonding nature of the $7p_{1/2}$ Tennessine is a synthetic element; it has symbol Ts and

atomic number 117. monohydride, TsH. S. It is named after the U. It has the second-highest atomic number, the joint-highest atomic mass of all known elements, and is the penultimate element of the 7th period of the periodic table. state of Tennessee, where key research institutions involved in its discovery are located (however, the IUPAC says that the element is named after the "region of Tennessee") d6310d7f96

Organogels Secondary. Secondary forces, such as van der Waals or hydrogen bonding, cause monomers to cluster into a non-covalently bonded network that retains organic solvent, and In polymer chemistry, an organogel is a class of gel composed of an organic liquid phase within a three-dimensional, cross-linked network. At a critical concentration (the gel point), the polymeric network becomes large enough so that on the macroscopic scale, the solution starts to exhibit gel-like physical properties: an extensive continuous solid network, no steady-state flow, and solid-like rheological properties. Organogel networks can form in two ways. However, organogels that are "low molecular weight gelators" can also be designed to form gels via self-assembly. The first is classic gel network formation via polymerization. This mechanism converts a precursor solution of monomers with various reactive sites into polymeric chains that grow into a single covalently-linked network d6310d7f96

Lie-to-children Similarly in chemistry, students are often introduced to the Arrhenius A lie-to-children is a simplified, and often technically incorrect, explanation of technical or complex subjects employed as a teaching method.
