The requirements of the standard are closely dependent on circumstances. Whether the standard of care has been breached is determined by the trier of fact, and is usually phrased in terms of the reasonable person; this is sometimes labeled as the "reasonable physician standard". It was famously described in *Vaughn v. Menlove* (1837) as whether the individual "proceed[ed] with such reasonable caution as a prudent man would have exercised under such circumstances". c3f167bc2f Factors that drive overuse include paying health professionals more to do more (fee-for-service), defensive medicine to protect against litigiousness, and insulation from price sensitivity in instances where the consumer is not the payer—the patient receives goods and services but insurance pays for them (whether public insurance, private, or both). Some proponents of evidence-based medicine suggest discontinuing the use of any treatment that has not been shown to provide a measurable benefit. Futile care discontinuation is distinct from euthanasia because euthanasia involves active intervention to end life, while withholding futile medical care does not encourage or hasten the natural onset of death. c3f167bc2f "The availability of good medical care tends to vary inversely with the need for it in the population served. Primary care Patients commonly receive primary care from professionals such as a primary care physician (general practitioner or family physician), a physician assistant, a

physical therapist, or a nurse practitioner. The basic health care unit (formerly: health care facility) is a medical entity that provides comprehensive care for people Primary care is the day-to-day healthcare given by a health care provider. Depending on the nature of the health condition, patients may then be referred for secondary or tertiary care. In some localities, such a professional may be a registered nurse, a pharmacist, a clinical officer (as in parts of Africa), or an Ayurvedic or other traditional medicine professional (as in parts of Asia). Typically, this provider acts as the first contact and principal point of continuing care for patients within a healthcare system, and coordinates any additional care the patient may require. health care system in Poland c3f167bc2f
