Haldane's decompression model Leonard Erskine Hill and Greenwood decompressed themselves without serious symptoms after exposure to 6 atm (610 kPa) Haldane's decompression model is a mathematical model for decompression to sea level atmospheric pressure of divers breathing compressed air at ambient pressure that was proposed in 1908 by the Scottish physiologist, John Scott Haldane (2 May 1860 – 14/15 March 1936), who was also famous for intrepid self-experimentation. atmosphere (atm) per 20 minutes would be safe 31e7518223

Haldane prepared the first recognized decompression table for the British Admiralty in 1908 based on extensive experiments on goats and other animals using a clinical endpoint of symptomatic decompression sickness. The model, commented as "a lasting contribution to the diving world", was published in the Journal of Hygiene. 31e7518223

In respiratory physiology, the partial pressure of a dissolved gas in liquid (such as oxygen in arterial blood) is also defined as the partial pressure of that gas as it would be undissolved in gas phase yet in equilibrium with the liquid. This concept is also known as blood gas tension. In this sense, the diffusion of a gas liquid is said to be driven by differences in partial pressure (not concentration). Partial pressure The total pressure of an ideal gas mixture is the sum of the partial pressures of the gases in the mixture (Dalton's Law). In respiratory physiology In a mixture of gases, each constituent gas has a partial pressure which is the notional pressure of that constituent gas as if it alone occupied the entire volume of the original mixture at the same temperature. Noble gas Under standard conditions, the first six of these elements are odorless, colorless, monatomic gases with very low chemical reactivity and cryogenic boiling points. Henry Louis Le Chatelier An air compressor forced the mixture of gases into a steel Berthelot bomb Henry Louis Le Chatelier (French pronunciation: [ãvi lwi læ ʃatɛlje]; 8 October 1850 – 17 September 1936) was a French chemist of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. hydrogen at a pressure of 200 atm and 600 °C in the presence of metallic iron. He devised Le Chatelier's principle, used by chemists to predict the effect a changing condition has on a system in chemical equilibrium 31e7518223

The elementary entities are usually molecules, atoms, ions, or ion pairs of a specified kind. For example, the molar volume of an ideal gas under standard conditions of 0 °C (273. The unit of amount of substance in the International System of Units is the mole (symbol: mol), a base unit. , the amount of sodium chloride (NaCl) could be denoted as $n\text{NaCl}$ or $n(\text{NaCl})$. g. The extent of the solubility of a substance in a specific solvent is generally measured as the concentration of the solute in a saturated solution, one in which no more solute can be dissolved. At this point, the two substances are said to be at the solubility equilibrium. For some solutes and solvents, there may be no such limit, in which case the two substances are said to be "miscible in all proportions" (or just "miscible"). 31e7518223 Haldane observed that goats, saturated to depths of 165 feet (50 m) of sea water, did not develop decompression sickness (DCS) if subsequent decompression... 31e7518223

Clathrate hydrate Most low molecular weight gases, including O₂, H₂, N₂, CO₂, CH₄, H₂S, Ar, Kr, Xe, and Cl₂ as well as some higher hydrocarbons and freons, will form hydrates at suitable temperatures and pressures. In other words, clathrate hydrates are clathrate compounds in which the host molecule is water and the guest molecule is typically a gas or liquid. Clathrate hydrates were discovered to form blockages in gas pipelines in 1934 by Hammerschmidt Clathrate hydrates, or gas hydrates, clathrates, or hydrates, are crystalline water-based solids physically resembling ice, in which small non-polar molecules (typically gases) or polar molecules with large hydrophobic moieties are trapped inside "cages" of hydrogen bonded, frozen water molecules. Without the

support of the trapped molecules, the lattice structure of hydrate clathrates would collapse into conventional ice crystal structure or liquid water. components following the mass action law in solution or gas state 31e7518223

The chemical activity of a species In electrochemistry, the Nernst equation is a chemical thermodynamical relationship that permits the calculation of the reduction potential of a reaction (half-cell or full cell reaction) from the standard electrode potential, absolute temperature, the number of electrons involved in the redox reaction, and activities (often approximated by concentrations) of the chemical species undergoing reduction and oxidation respectively 31e7518223

Gases are always miscible In chemistry, solubility is the ability of a substance, the solute, to form a solution with another substance, the solvent. Both may be pure substances, or may themselves be solutions. Insolubility is the opposite property, the inability of the solute to form such a solution 31e7518223
