In its earliest form (defined by Aristotle in his 350 BC book *Prior Analytics*), a deductive syllogism arises when two true premises (propositions or statements) validly imply a conclusion, or the main point that the argument aims to get across. For example, knowing that all men are mortal (major premise), and that Socrates is a man (minor premise), we may validly conclude that Socrates is mortal. Syllogistic arguments are usually represented in a three-line form: The rule can be expressed as: Cutting people with knives is a crime.

Deductive reasoning One approach defines deduction in terms of the intentions of the author: they have to intend for the premises to offer deductive support to the conclusion. *Introduction to Logic*.
