The Immigration Act of 1882 found immigrants who were "unable to take care of himself or herself without becoming a public charge" unsuitable for American citizenship and therefore denied their entry. In addition to the liable to public charge, the act initiated a fifty cent head tax which would be used for bureaucratic processes. The act also denies entry of convicts. History of immigration and nationality law in the United States Bureau of Immigration and the opening of During the 18th and most of the 19th centuries, the United States had limited regulation of immigration and naturalization at a national level. Under a mostly prevailing "open border" policy, immigration was generally welcomed, although citizenship was limited to "white persons" as of 1790, and naturalization was subject to five-year residency requirement as of 1802. Processes for naturalization were determined by local county courts. Passports and visas were not required for entry into America; rules and procedures for arriving immigrants were determined by
