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Juxtacrine signalling There are three types of juxtacrine signaling:. Hence, this stands in contrast to releasing a signaling molecule by diffusion into extracellular space, the use of long-range conduits like membrane nanotubes and cytonemes (akin to 'bridges') or the use of extracellular vesicles like exosomes or microvesicles (akin to 'boats'). In this type of signalling, a ligand on one surface binds to a receptor on another adjacent surface.
