Asylum confinement of Christopher Smart For he has the subtlety and hissing of The English poet Christopher Smart (1722–1771) was confined to mental asylums from May 1757 until January 1763. For he is of the tribe of Tiger. Smart was admitted to St Luke's Hospital for Lunatics, Upper Moorfields, London, on 6 May 1757. All that is known of his years of confinement is that he wrote poetry. Smart's isolation led him to abandon the poetic genres of the 18th century that had marked his earlier work and to write religious poetry such as *Jubilate Agno* ("Rejoice in the Lamb"). His asylum poetry reveals a desire for "unmediated revelation", and it is possible that the self-evaluation found in his poetry represents an expression of evangelical Christianity...
