The four principle trails are the Mesa-, Moonridge-, Wildwood Canyon- and Santa Rosa Trails. Over 250 plant species have been recorded in Wildwood, as well as 37 species of mammals, 70 bird species, and 22 species of amphibians and reptiles.

Amphibian Evolved to be mostly semiaquatic, amphibians have adapted to inhabit a wide variety of habitats, with most species living in freshwater, wetland or terrestrial ecosystems (such as riparian woodland, fossorial and even arboreal habitats). All extant (living) amphibians belong to the monophyletic subclass Lissamphibia, with three living orders: Anura (frogs and toads), Urodela (salamanders), and Gymnophiona (caecilians). Many aquatic salamanders and all tadpoles have gills in their larval Amphibians are ectothermic, anamniotic, four-limbed vertebrate animals that constitute the class Amphibia. In its broadest sense, it is a paraphyletic group encompassing all tetrapods, but excluding the amniotes (tetrapods with an amniotic membrane, such as modern reptiles, birds and mammals). Their life cycle typically starts out as aquatic larvae with gills known as tadpoles, but some species have developed behavioural adaptations to bypass this. exchange, most famously the plethodontid salamanders, which have neither lungs nor gills

Autotomy Some lizards, salamanders, snakes, and tuatara when caught by the tail will shed part of it in attempting Autotomy ('self-amputation', from the Ancient Greek auto-, "self-" and tome, "severing") is the behaviour whereby an animal sheds or discards an appendage, usually as a self-preservation mechanism to elude a predator's grasp or to distract the predator and thereby allow escape. As with other *Heterodon* species, it has a distinctive threat reaction of first bluffing by striking with a closed mouth and then, if this fails to deter the threat, pretending to die. punctures and deflates toads to be able to swallow them whole

== Vertebrates == Salamander diversity is highest in eastern North America, especially in the Appalachian Mountains; most species are found in the Holarctic realm, with some species present in the Neotropical realm. Salamanders never have more than four toes on their front legs and five on their rear legs, but some species have fewer digits and others lack hind limbs. Their permeable skin usually makes them reliant on habitats in or near water or other cool, damp places. Some salamander species are fully aquatic throughout their lives, some take to the water intermittently, and others are entirely terrestrial as adults.

Arboreal locomotion Some animals may scale trees only occasionally (scansorial), but others are exclusively arboreal. In habitats in which trees are present, animals have evolved to move in them. Dry adhesion Arboreal locomotion is the locomotion of animals in trees. Furthermore, many of these same principles may be applied to climbing without trees, such as on rock piles or mountains. The habitats pose numerous mechanical challenges to animals moving through them and lead to a variety of anatomical, behavioral and ecological consequences as well as variations throughout different species. Wet adhesion is common in tree frogs and arboreal salamanders, and functions either by suction or by capillary adhesion. smooth surfaces

Heterodon platirhinos has a wide geographical range from the central United States to the East Coast. In the northern parts of its range, it can be found in southern Ontario, southern New Hampshire, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Massachusetts. Farther west, the snake can be found... Common names Arboreal habitats pose numerous mechanical challenges to animals moving in them, which have been solved in diverse ways. These challenges include moving on narrow branches, moving up and down inclines, balancing, crossing gaps, and dealing with obstructions.

Salamander All ten extant salamander families are grouped together under the order Urodela, the sole surviving order from the group Caudata. Urodela is a scientific Latin term based on the Ancient Greek οὐρά δῆλη: *ourà dêlē* "conspicuous tail". Caudata is the Latin for "tailed ones", from cauda: "tail". Most salamanders are between 10 and 20 cm (4 and 8 in) in length. An adult salamander generally resembles Salamanders are a group of amphibians typically characterized by their lizard-like appearance, with slender bodies, blunt snouts, short limbs projecting at right angles to the body, and the presence of a tail in both larvae and adults. Agkistrodon piscivorus It tends to be found in or near water, particularly in slow-moving and shallow lakes, streams, and marshes. It is a capable swimmer, and like several species of snakes, is known to occasionally enter bays and estuaries and swim between barrier islands and the mainland. As an adult, it is large and capable of delivering a painful and potentially fatal bite. larger snakes are more likely to strike than smaller snakes. When threatened, it may respond by coiling its body and displaying its fangs. Brown (1973) gave an average venom yield (dried) of 125 mg, with a range of 80–237 mg, along with *Agkistrodon piscivorus* is a species of venomous snake, a pit viper in the subfamily Crotalinae of the family Viperidae. Individuals may bite when feeling threatened or being handled in any way. It is one of the world's few semiaquatic vipers (along with the Florida cottonmouth), and is native to the Southeastern United States 52474cc816

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
