Shear strength (discontinuity) non-reversible deformation on reduction of stress. Many slopes, natural and man-made, fail due to a low shear strength of discontinuities in the soil or rock mass in the slope. Fractures are commonly caused by stress exceeding the rock strength, causing the rock to lose cohesion along its weakest plane. A fracture will sometimes form a deep fissure or crevice in the rock. Fractures can provide permeability for fluid movement, such as water or hydrocarbons. Highly fractured rocks can make good aquifers or hydrocarbon reservoirs, since they may possess both significant permeability and fracture porosity a46b6b8ce1

Stress (mechanics) An object being pushed together In continuum mechanics, stress is a physical quantity that describes forces present during deformation. an object being pulled apart, such as a stretched elastic band, is subject to tensile stress and may undergo elongation. An object being pushed together, such as a crumpled sponge, is subject to compressive stress and may undergo shortening. The greater the force and the smaller the cross-sectional area of the body on which it acts, the greater the stress.
