It proposes that a basic psychological conflict results from having a self-preservation instinct while realizing that death is inevitable and to some extent unpredictable. Klein suggested that pre-verbal existential anxiety in infancy catalyzed the formation of the unconscious, which resulted in the unconscious splitting of the world into good and bad idealizations. Klein's work primarily focused on the role of ambivalence and moral ambiguity in human development. She was the primary figure in the development of object relations theory. The quality of resolution can inform the presence, absence, and/or type of distresses a person experiences later in life. Fight-or-flight response More specifically, the adrenal medulla produces a hormonal cascade that results in the secretion of catecholamines, especially norepinephrine and epinephrine. It was first described by Walter Bradford Cannon in 1915. The hormones estrogen, testosterone, and cortisol, as well as the neurotransmitters dopamine and serotonin, also affect how organisms react to stress.
