Fear of the dark posited in the 1960s, when scientists conducted experiments in a search for molecules responsible for memory. When waking up or sleeping, these fears may intertwine with sighting sleep paralysis demons in some people. When fear of the dark reaches a degree that is severe enough to be considered pathological, it is sometimes called. Some degree of fear of the dark is natural, especially as a phase of child development. Most observers report that fear of the dark rarely appears before the age of two years and roughly peaks around the development stage of four years of age. Most toddlers and children outgrow it, but this fear persists for some as a phobia and anxiety. A fear of the dark does not always concern darkness itself; it can also be a fear of possible or imagined dangers concealed by darkness.
