Babylonian astronomy They began studying and recording Babylonian astronomy was the study or recording of celestial objects during the early history of Mesopotamia. During the 8th and 7th centuries BC, Babylonian astronomers developed a new empirical approach to astronomy. This system simplified the calculating and recording of unusually great and small numbers. Qibla Mathematical methods based on astronomy would develop only at the end of the 8th century or the beginning of the 9th, and even then The qibla (Arabic: **قِبْلَة**, lit. Prior to this revelation, Muhammad and his followers in Medina faced Jerusalem for prayers. Most mosques contain a mihrab (a wall niche) that indicates the direction of the qibla. qibla in new locations. In Islam, the Kaaba is believed to be a sacred site built by prophets Abraham and Ishmael, and that its use as the qibla was ordained by God in several verses of the Quran revealed to Muhammad in the second Hijri year.
