Three years later, on May 21, 1863, the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists was formed and the movement became an official organization. Missionary activity ceased after the communist take over of China in 1949. Adventist missionaries in Sichuan were organized under the Szechwan Mission, later split into the East Szechwan, West Szechwan, and Tibetan Missions. Missionary activity in China generated controversy among many native Chinese and faced opposition from popular riots and the later Communist movement in China. The Pillars of Adventism are landmark doctrines for Seventh-day Adventists. The Seventh-day Adventist church teaches that these Pillars are needed to prepare the world for the second coming of Jesus Christ, and sees them as a central part of its own mission. They are Bible doctrines that define who they are as a people of faith; doctrines that are "non-negotiables" in Adventist theology. The Seventh-day Adventist Church is "one of the fastest-growing and most widespread churches worldwide", with a worldwide baptized membership of over 25 million in 212 countries. Adventists believe in the infallibility of the Scripture's teaching regarding salvation, which comes from grace through faith in Jesus Christ. The 28 fundamental beliefs constitute the church's current doctrinal positions, but they are revisable under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and are not a creed a76a6c9469

Seventh-day Adventist eschatology Adventist eschatology, which is based on a historicist interpretation of prophecy, is characterised principally by the premillennial Second Coming of Christ. At Jesus' return, the righteous will be taken to heaven for one thousand years. Traditionally, the church has taught that the Second Coming will be preceded by a global crisis with the Sabbath as a central issue.
