St Catherine's College, Oxford rooms with en-suite facilities and a new common room. This is in addition to 42 single rooms, with shared bathroom and cooking facilities, in St Catherine’s St Catherine's College (colloquially called St Catz or Catz) is one of the constituent colleges of the University of Oxford. In 1974, it was one of the first men's colleges to admit women. As of November 2024, it has 494 undergraduate students and 337 graduate students, making it one of the largest colleges in either Oxford or Cambridge. The college developed from the St Catherine's Society; it was granted full status as a college in 1962, after a campaign by the historian Alan Bullock, who became the first master of the college, and later vice-chancellor of the university

The premiere of The Planets was at the Queen's Hall, London, on 29 September 1918, conducted by Holst's friend Adrian Boult before an invited audience of about 250 people. Three concerts at which movements from the suite were played were given in 1919 and early 1920. The first complete performance at a public concert was given at the Queen's Hall on 15 November 1920 by the London Symphony Orchestra conducted by Albert Coates.

First Suite in E-flat for Military Band It is considered one of the cornerstone masterworks in the concert band repertoire. It is not apparent from the score, but Holst let it be known The First Suite in E♭ for Military Band, Op. Officially premiered in 1920 at the Royal Military School of Music, the manuscript was originally completed in 1909. 1983 and 2019. 28, No. 1 is written by the English composer Gustav Holst. The First Suite has three movements, each with its own character and form. Along with the subsequent Second Suite in F for Military Band, written in 1911 and premiered in 1922, the First Suite convinced many other prominent composers that serious music could be written specifically for band

Williams first recorded the suite as part of a trio for Asch records and followed this with two notable performances with larger groups. The first performance was with a chamber jazz group and the second was with a symphony orchestra at Carnegie Hall in New York City. These performances took such a toll on Williams...

In a Nutshell The suite, published in 1916, is made up of four movements: "Arrival Platform Humlet", "Gay But Wistful", "Pastoral", and "The Gum-Suckers March". The suite makes use of elements of classical music alongside jazz, and Williams was influenced by modernism when writing and arranging it. Williams began writing music for Zodiac Suite in 1942 and finished the composition in 1945. Each song in the suite is inspired by an astrological sign and musicians or performers who were born under it

Albertus Bryne His son, also called Albertus, worked with him at St Paul’s Cathedral Albertus Bryne (variants: Albert Bryan; Albert Brian) (ca. His suites are among the earliest surviving English examples with four movements. 1621 – 2 December 1668) was an English organist and composer

String orchestras can be of chamber orchestra size ranging from between 12 (4 first violins, 3 second violins, 2 violas, 2 cellos and 1 bass = 12) and 21 musicians (6 first violins, 5 second violins, 4 violas, 4 cellos and 2 double basses= 21) sometimes performing without a conductor. It could also consist of the entire string section of a large symphony orchestra which could have 60 musicians (16 first violins, 14 second...

Paul Ladmirault Claude Debussy wrote that his work possessed a "fine dreamy musicality", commenting on its characteristically hesitant character by suggesting that it sounded as if it was "afraid of expressing itself too much". Peter Warlock dedicated his Capriol Suite to him and Swan Hennessy his Trio, Op. Florent Schmitt said of him: "Of all the musicians of his generation, he was perhaps the most talented, most original, but also the most modest".
