Palo (religion) It draws heavily upon the traditional Kongo religion of Central Africa, with additional influences taken from Catholicism and from Spiritism. This was followed by the Portuguese landing and settling temporarily (due to the monsoons) in some of the Caroline Islands and Papua New Guinea. reputation of the inhabitants; they were seen as being violent towards outsiders, and were known to practice cannibalism. Several Spanish landings in the Caroline Islands and New Guinea came after. After the 17th century Dutch landings in New Zealand and Australia, with no settlement in these lands, the British became the dominant colonial power in the region, establishing settler colonies in what would become Australia and New Zealand.
