Metalloid There is no standard definition of a metalloid and no complete agreement on which elements are metalloids. Its solution chemistry is characterised by the formation of oxyanions. The high strength of the silicon-oxygen bond dominates the chemical behaviour A metalloid is a chemical element which has a preponderance of properties in between, or that are a mixture of, those of metals and nonmetals. Despite the lack of specificity, the term remains in use in the literature. The word metalloid comes from the Latin metallum ("metal") and the Greek oeides ("resembling in form or appearance"). nonmetals 193eaefb3c

The six commonly recognised metalloids are boron, silicon, germanium, arsenic, antimony and tellurium. Five elements are less frequently so classified: carbon, aluminium, selenium, polonium and astatine. Thallium It was isolated by both Lamy and Crookes in 1862, Lamy by electrolysis and Crookes by precipitation and melting of the resultant powder. Thallium, from Greek θάλλος, thallós, meaning "green shoot" or "twig", was named by Crookes. Both used the newly developed method of flame spectroscopy, in which thallium produces a notable green spectral line. Thallium is a chemical element; it has symbol Tl and atomic number 81. It is a silvery-white post-transition metal that is not found free in nature. Chemists William Crookes and Claude-Auguste Lamy discovered thallium independently, in 1861, in residues of sulfuric acid

production. Crookes exhibited it as a powder precipitated by zinc at the International Exhibition, which opened. It is a silvery-white post-transition metal that is not found free in nature. Physically, they are usually lighter (less dense) than elements that form metals and are often poor conductors of heat and electricity. They range from colorless gases like hydrogen to shiny crystals like iodine
