Nonmetal Physically, they are usually lighter (less dense) than elements that form metals and are often poor conductors of heat and electricity. They range from colorless gases like hydrogen to shiny crystals like iodine. Among the elements, fluorine ranks 24th in cosmic abundance and 13th in crustal abundance. Fluorite, the primary mineral source of fluorine, which gave the element its name, was first described in 1529; as it was added to metal ores to lower their melting points for smelting, the Latin verb fluo meaning 'to flow' gave the mineral its name.
