The theory that quilts and songs were used to communicate information about the Underground Railroad is disputed among historians. Her father, Morris Trimble Short, was a Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints-affiliated frontier missionary, and her mother, Viola Vernon Short, was a librarian for the church and avidly promoted children's education. McKim had an older sister and one elder brother. The family was poor and relied... Biography == In 1855, at the age of eighteen, Powers married Armstead Powers. They had at least nine children together. The quilts of Gee's Bend are among the most important African-American visual and cultural contributions to the history of art within the United States. The women of Gee's Bend have gained international attention and acclaim for their artistry, with exhibitions of Gee's Bend quilts held in museums and galleries across the United States and beyond. This recognition has, in turn, brought increased economic opportunities to the community. The 1999 book *Hidden in Plain View*, by Raymond Dobard, Jr., an art historian, and Jacqueline Tobin, a college instructor in Colorado, explores how quilts were used to communicate information about the Underground Railroad. The idea for the book came from Ozella McDaniel Williams who told Tobin that her family had passed down a story for generations about... In December 1965, the Episcopal priest Francis X. Walter was in Wilcox County when a quilt on a clothesline outside a small home caught his eye. He had long been fascinated by American folk art and was interested in the quilt's bold design. The women began selling their quilts to Walter, who purchased them for \$10 each. Walter was a priest who was returning to the area as part of the Selma Inter-religious Project. He received a \$700 grant and traveled through the Black Belt, looking for quilts that a friend of his would sell in New York at auction. In the early stages, before the Freedom Quilting Bee was fully formed, quilts were sometimes made for sale in New York, while others came from the quilters' own beds or even family... The quilting tradition can be dated back to the nineteenth century and endures to this day. The residents of Gee's Bend, Alabama, are direct descendants of the enslaved people who worked the cotton plantation established in 1816 by Joseph Gee. Powers was born into slavery in 1837 near Athens, Georgia. She is believed to have spent her early life on a plantation as an enslaved person, owned by John and Nancy Lester in Madison County and learned to sew from other enslaved persons or from her female enslaver.
