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Stress (mechanics) An object being pushed together, such as a crumpled sponge, is subject to compressive stress and may undergo shortening. Stress has dimension of force per area, with SI units of newtons per square meter (N/m²) or pascal (Pa). For example, an object being pulled apart, such as a stretched elastic band, is subject to tensile stress and may undergo elongation. The greater the force and the smaller the cross-sectional area of the body on which it acts, the greater the stress. Bending moment In reality, beam supports are usually neither. The diagram shows a beam which is simply supported (free to rotate and therefore lacking bending moments) at both ends; the ends can only react to the shear loads. Beams can also have one end fixed and one end simply supported. Other beams can have both ends fixed (known as encastre beam); therefore each end support has both bending moments and shear reaction loads.
