Lost literary work This term most commonly applies to works from the classical world, although it is increasingly used in relation to modern works. A work may be lost to history through the destruction of an original manuscript and all later copies. Only five Greek to Latin translations are held by libraries A lost literary work (referred throughout this article just as a lost work) is a document, literary work, or piece of multimedia, produced of which no surviving copies are known to exist, meaning it can be known only through reference, or literary fragments. copies of The Necronomicon (Al Azif) have been destroyed, as well as the Arabic to Greek translations cad98b4530

Australian literature Among the important authors of classic Australian works are the poets Henry Lawson, Banjo Australian literature is the written or literary work produced in the area or by the people of the Commonwealth of Australia and its preceding colonies. However, the narrative art of Australian writers has, since 1788, introduced the character of a new continent into literature—exploring such themes as Aboriginality, mateship, egalitarianism, democracy, national identity, migration, Australia's unique location and geography, the complexities of urban living, and "the beauty and the terror" of life in the Australian bush. novelists Alexis Wright, Michelle de Kretser and Richard Flanagan. John Henry Wright In this John Henry Wright (February 4, 1852 – November 25, 1908) was an American classical scholar born at Urumiah (Rezaieh), Persia. He earned his Bachelors (1873) and Masters (1876) at Dartmouth College, New Hampshire. After junior

appointments (first in Ohio and then at Dartmouth) in 1886 he joined Johns Hopkins as a professor of classical philology. In 1894, his "Studies in Sophocles" was published. papyrus of Herondas. In 1902, Wright edited and published Masterpieces of Greek literature. In 1887, he became a professor of Greek at Harvard, where, from 1895 to 1908, he was also Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences cad98b4530

Frank Lloyd Wright (June 8, 1867 – April 9, 1959) was an American architect, designer, writer, and educator. Wright believed in designing in harmony with humanity and the environment, a philosophy he called organic architecture. He designed more than 1,000 structures over a creative period of 70 years. This philosophy was exemplified in Fallingwater (1935), which has been called "the best all-time work of American architecture". Frank Lloyd Wright works: "Sacred Spaces", "A Child of the Sun", "Romanza", and "Masterpieces", by Michael Miner, of the Frank Lloyd Wright Revival Initiative Frank Lloyd Wright Sr. Wright played a key role in the architectural movements of the twentieth century, influencing architects worldwide through his works and mentoring hundreds of apprentices in his Taliesin Fellowship cad98b4530

His work from the late 1980s onwards embraced world music and the new age genre, although none of his post-1976 releases matched the same level of popularity as The Dream Weaver cad98b4530

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
