tooth contacts should not be looked at in isolation, but in relation to the overall masticatory system.

Static occlusion refers to contact between teeth when the jaw is closed and stationary, while dynamic occlusion refers to occlusal contacts made when the jaw is moving. There are two main types of bruxism: one occurs during sleep (nocturnal bruxism) and one during wakefulness (awake bruxism). Dental damage may be similar in both types, but the symptoms...

Overjet The modern discipline of orthodontics was begun by the establishment of the Angle classification. In dentistry, overjet is the extent of horizontal (anterior-posterior) overlap of the maxillary central incisors over the mandibular central incisors. a term he latinised and popularised as malocclusion. In class II (division I) malocclusion the overjet is increased as the maxillary central incisors are protruded

Class II Division I is an incisal classification of malocclusion where the incisal edge of the mandibular incisors lie posterior to the cingulum plateau of the maxillary incisors with normal or proclined maxillary incisors (British Standards Index, 1983). There is always an associated increase in overjet.

Occlusion (dentistry) More technically, it is the relationship between the maxillary (upper) and

mandibular (lower) teeth when they approach each other, as occurs during chewing or at rest.
