Cognitive behavioral therapy The work of Claire Weekes Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) is a form of psychotherapy that aims to reduce symptoms of various mental health conditions, primarily depression, and disorders such as PTSD and anxiety disorders. therapy with their works on social learning theory by demonstrating the effects of cognition on learning and behavior modification. This alteration in a person's thinking produces less anxiety and depression. This therapy focuses on challenging unhelpful and irrational negative thoughts and beliefs, referred to as 'self-talk' and replacing them with more rational positive self-talk.
