Test anxiety Research suggests that high levels of emotional distress have a direct correlation to reduced academic performance and higher overall student drop-out rates. Symptoms of test anxiety can range Test anxiety is a combination of physiological over-arousal, tension and somatic symptoms, along with worry, dread, fear of failure, and catastrophizing, that occur before or during test situations. Test anxiety can have broader consequences, negatively affecting a student's social, emotional and behavioural development, as well as their feelings about themselves and school. It is a psychological condition in which people experience extreme stress, anxiety, and discomfort during and/or before taking a test ab88b6e9e6
