It forms an essential component of language and communication, helping convey thoughts, ideas, emotions, and information. Acquiring an adequate vocabulary is one of the largest challenges in learning a second language. Vocabulary can be oral, written, or signed and can be categorized into two main types: active vocabulary (words one uses regularly) and passive vocabulary (words one recognizes but does not use often). The word vocabulary originated from the Latin vocabulum, meaning "a word, name". The adjective "deep" refers to the use of multiple layers (ranging from three to several hundred or thousands) in the network. The field takes inspiration from biological neuroscience and is centered around stacking artificial neurons into layers and "training" them to process data

Reading comprehension In education it is measured in standardized tests that report which percentile a reader's ability falls. Reading comprehension occurs on a gradient or spectrum, rather than being yes/no (all-or-nothing). Reading comprehension relies on two abilities that are connected to each other: word reading and language comprehension. background knowledge, their own ideas, communicating, and learning new concepts. The opposite of reading comprehension is called functional illiteracy. Reading comprehension is beyond basic literacy alone, which is the ability to decipher characters and words at all. Comprehension specifically is a "creative, multifaceted process" that is dependent upon four language skills: phonology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics. Vocabulary has been described as "the glue that holds stories, ideas Reading comprehension is the ability to process written text, understand its meaning, and to integrate with what the reader already knows

Synthetic phonics When learners can read enough words with Synthetic phonics, also known as blended phonics or inductive phonics, is a method of teaching English reading which first teaches letter-sounds (grapheme/phoneme correspondences) and then how to blend (synthesise) these sounds to achieve full pronunciation of whole words. It does not teach whole words as shapes (initial sight vocabulary) prior to learning the alphabetic code. one
