

Hawksmoor Peter Ackroyd

Nicholas Hawksmoor Part of his work has been correctly attributed to him only relatively recently, and his influence has reached several poets and authors of the twentieth century. He was a leading figure of the English Baroque style of architecture in the late-seventeenth and early-eighteenth centuries. This idea was, however, embellished by Peter Ackroyd in his novel *Hawksmoor* (1985): the historical Hawksmoor is refigured as the fictional Devil-worshipper Nicholas Hawksmoor (c. Elias in *Sublime Desire: History and Post-1960s Fiction*. M. A metahistorical romance does not merely use history for the setting and events of the novel, but forces the reader to reexamine history, and their own view of it. It accomplishes this by reinterpreting historical events, writing about ordinary people, crossing between various time periods, or bending history in other ways. Elias defines metahistorical romance as a form of historical fiction continuing the legacy of historical romance inaugurated by Sir Walter Scott but also having ties to contemporary postmodern historiography. In Elias's usage, romance does not signify novels focused on marriage and love, but instead a style in which past events
