Ferranti produced a version of Meg with the Williams The Manchester Mark 1 was one of the earliest stored-program computers, developed at the Victoria University of Manchester, England from the Manchester Baby (operational in June 1948). Work began in August 1948, and the first version was operational by April 1949; a program written to search for Mersenne primes ran error-free for nine hours on the night of 16/17 June 1949. It was smaller and simpler than the Mark 1, and much faster for maths problems

They intend to act as centres of excellence in their specialism and, in some circumstances, may select pupils for their aptitude in it. Maths schools admit students on a selective basis, with an 8 grade in GCSE maths being the minimum requirement.
