A dynamical system may also be introduced to embed operations research problems within the framework of optimal control theory. Or the dynamical system could be a nation's economy, with the objective to minimize unemployment; the controls in this case could be fiscal and monetary policy. It has numerous applications in science, engineering and operations research.
