Historically, "corruption" had a broader meaning concerned with an activity's impact on morals and societal well-being: for example, the ancient Greek philosopher Socrates was condemned to death in part for "corrupting the young". Since 2012, the Corruption Perceptions Index has been ranked on a scale from 100 (very clean) to 0 (highly corrupt). Previously, the index was scored on a scale of 10 to 0; it was originally rounded to two decimal spaces from 1995-1997 and to a single decimal space from 1998.

Islamic ethics It is distinguished from "Islamic morality", which pertains to "specific norms or codes of behavior". Islamic ethics (Arabic: أخلاق إسلامية) is the "philosophical reflection upon moral conduct" with a view to defining "good character" and attaining the "pleasure of God" (raza-e Ilahi)

Corruption Perceptions Index The CPI generally defines corruption as an "abuse of entrusted power for private gain". The Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI) is an index that scores and ranks countries by their perceived levels of public sector corruption, as assessed by experts and business executives. The index has been published annually by the non-governmental organisation Transparency International since 1995

Noble cause corruption The knowing misconduct by a law enforcement officer or prosecutor with the goal of attaining what the officer believes is a "just" result. Where traditional corruption is defined by personal gain, noble cause corruption forms when someone is convinced of their righteousness, and will do anything within their powers to achieve the desired result. Noble cause corruption is corruption caused by the adherence to a teleological ethical system, suggesting that people will use unethical or illegal means to attain desirable goals, a result which appears to benefit the greater good. An example of noble cause corruption is police misconduct "committed in the name of good ends", or neglect of due process through "a moral commitment to make the world a safer place to live". Police corruption Corrupt acts include taking bribes, stealing from victims or suspects,

and manipulating evidence to affect the outcome of legal proceedings (such as in a frameup). According to the field of Police Ethics, noble cause corruption is police misconduct. Police corruption is a form of police misconduct in which a law enforcement officer breaks their political contract and abuses their power for personal gain. Police corruption challenges the human rights of citizens, and can undermine public trust in the police when uncovered or suspected. Over time, corruption has been defined differently. For example, while performing work for a government or as a representative, it is unethical to accept a gift.
