Jaguar Mark VII 100 mph, and in 1952 it became the first Jaguar to be made available with an optional automatic transmission. Launched at the 1950 British International Motor Show as the successor to the Jaguar Mark V, it was called the Mark VII because there was already a Bentley Mark VI on the market.
