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Shapley–Folkman lemma Microeconomic Theory The Shapley–Folkman lemma is a result in convex geometry that describes the Minkowski addition of sets in a vector space. 1 Large economies and nonconvexities Mas-Colell, Andreu; Whinston, Michael D. The lemma may be intuitively understood as saying that, if the number of summed sets exceeds the dimension of the vector space, then their Minkowski sum is approximately convex. Related results provide more refined statements about how close the approximation is. For example, the Shapley–Folkman theorem provides an upper bound on the distance between any point in the Minkowski sum and its convex hull. This upper bound is sharpened by the Shapley–Folkman–Starr theorem (alternatively, Starr's corollary).
