Method of levels The therapist asks what they were just thinking or feeling, and as the patient talks about that the therapist continues to be alert for intrusion of background thoughts or feelings. The DMM was initially created by developmental psychologist Patricia McKinsey Crittenden and her colleagues including David DiLalla, Angelika Claussen, Andrea Landini, Steve Farnfield, and Susan Spieker. It developed initially from attachment theory as developed by John Bowlby and Mary Ainsworth, and incorporated many other theories into a comprehensive model of adaptation to life's many dangers b132e738bd

Tinbergen gave only the fourth question, as Aristotle's formulation failed to distinguish between survival value and evolutionary history Tinbergen's four questions, named after 20th century biologist Nikolaas Tinbergen, are complementary categories of explanations for animal behaviour. Adolf Meyer (psychiatrist) He oversaw the building and development of the Henry Phipps Psychiatric Clinic at Johns Hopkins Hospital, opened in April 1913, making sure it was suitable for scientific research, training and treatment. His focus on collecting detailed case histories on patients was one of the most prominent of his contributions. Meyer was also involved Adolf Meyer (September 13, 1866 – March 17, 1950) was a Swiss-born psychiatrist who rose to prominence as the first psychiatrist-in-chief of the Johns Hopkins Hospital (1910–1941). Meyer's work at the Phipps Clinic is possibly the most significant aspect of his career.
