Phrase structure rules A grammar that uses phrase structure rules is a type of phrase structure grammar. Phrase structure rules as they are commonly employed operate according to the constituency relation, and a grammar that employs phrase structure rules is therefore a constituency grammar; as such, it stands in contrast to dependency grammars, which are based on the dependency relation. They are used to break down a natural language sentence into its constituent parts, also known as syntactic

categories, including both lexical categories (parts of speech) and phrasal categories. relations between sentences to be reflected in the grammar. An important aspect of phrase structure rules is that they view sentence structure from the top Phrase structure rules are a type of rewrite rule used to describe a given language's syntax and are closely associated with the early stages of transformational grammar, proposed by Noam Chomsky in 1957 bc14cd182d

where it is a cleft pronoun and X is the cleft constituent, usually a noun phrase (although it can also be a prepositional phrase, and in some cases an adjectival or adverbial phrase). The focus is on X, or else on the subordinate clause or some element of it. For example: bc14cd182d Ramsey sentences were introduced by the logical empiricist philosopher Rudolf Carnap. Henry Sweet described sentence words as 'an area under one's control' and gave words such as "Come!", "John!", "Alas!", "Yes." and "No." as examples of sentence words. The Dutch linguist J. M. Hoogvliet described sentence words as "volzinwoorden". They were also noted in 1891 by Georg von der Gabelentz, whose observations were extensively elaborated by Hoogvliet in 1903; he does not list "Yes." and "No." as sentence words. Wegener called sentence words "Wortsätze". bc14cd182d The relation of nominal sentences to verbal sentences is a question of tense marking. In most languages with nominal

sentences such as Russian, Arabic and Hebrew, the copular verb does not surface in indicational present tense sentences. Conversely, these languages allow the copular verb in non-present sentences. bc14cd182d That is to say, for example, that the truth of the sentence "John is Greek and John is happy" is a function of the meaning of "and", and the truth values of the atomic sentences "John is Greek" and "John is happy". The topic of a sentence is distinct from the grammatical subject. The topic is defined by pragmatic considerations, that is, the context that provides meaning. The grammatical subject is defined by syntax. In any given sentence the

topic and grammatical subject may be the same, but they need not be. For example, in the sentence "As for the little girl, the dog bit her..."
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
