Grammatical case Here, nominative and accusative are cases, that is, categories of pronouns corresponding to the functions they have in representation. In various languages, nominal groups consisting of a noun and its modifiers belong to one of a few such categories. Words that are not function words are called content words (or open class words, lexical words, or autosemantic words) and include nouns, most verbs, adjectives, and most adverbs, although some adverbs are function words (like then and why). Dictionaries define the specific meanings of content words but can describe only the general usages of function words. By contrast...

Grammaticality The notion of In linguistics, grammaticality is determined by the conformity to language usage as derived by the grammar of a particular speech variety. These rules of grammaticality also provide explanations of ill-formed, ungrammatical sentences. The notion of grammaticality rose alongside the theory of generative grammar, the goal of which is to formulate rules that define well-formed, grammatical sentences. In linguistics, grammaticality is determined by the conformity to language usage as derived by the grammar of a particular speech variety

Universal grammar However, the latter has not been firmly established. The advocates of this theory emphasize and partially rely on the poverty of the stimulus (POS) argument and the existence of some universal properties of natural human languages. The basic postulate of UG is that there are innate constraints on what the grammar of a possible human language could be. When linguistic stimuli are received in the course of language acquisition, children then adopt specific syntactic rules that conform to UG. Van Rooy speculates that Bacon’s references to grammar

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concerned a 'quasi-universal nature of grammatical categories,' whereas his assertions on Greek and Universal grammar (UG), in modern linguistics, is the theory of the innate biological component of the language faculty, usually credited to Noam Chomsky

In theoretical linguistics, a speaker's judgement on the well-formedness of a linguistic 'string'—called a grammaticality judgement—is based on whether the sentence is interpreted in accordance with the rules and constraints of the relevant grammar. If the rules and constraints of the particular lect are followed, then the sentence is judged to be grammatical. In contrast, an ungrammatical sentence... is a linguistic process in which words change from representing objects or actions to serving grammatical functions. Grammaticalization can involve content words, such as nouns and verbs, developing into new function words that express grammatical relationships among other words in a sentence. This may happen rather than speakers deriving such new function words from (for example) existing bound, inflectional constructions. For example, the Old English verb willan 'to want', 'to wish' has become the Modern English auxiliary verb will, which expresses intention or simply futurity. Some concepts are often grammaticalized; others, such as evidentiality, less frequently.
