The bas-relief In Ancient Greece a thyrsus ( ) or thyrsos ( ; Ancient Greek: θύρσος) was a wand or staff of giant fennel (*Ferula communis*) covered with ivy vines and leaves, sometimes wound with taeniae and topped with a pine cone, artichoke, fennel, or by a bunch of vine-leaves and grapes or ivy-leaves and berries, carried during Hellenic festivals and religious ceremonies. The thyrsus is typically associated with the Greek god Dionysus (and his subsequent Roman equivalent Bacchus) as a symbol of prosperity, fertility, and hedonism 10b9f28801

Ovid himself attributed his banishment to a *carmen et error* ("poem and a mistake"), but his reluctance to disclose specifics has resulted in much speculation among scholars. Although Ovid enjoyed enormous popularity during his lifetime, the emperor Augustus exiled him to Tomis, the capital of the newly organized province of Moesia, on the Black Sea, where he remained for the last nine or 10 years of his life. He was a younger contemporary of Virgil and Horace, with whom he is often ranked as one of the three canonical poets of Latin literature 10b9f28801
